The 2020 State Wage Order issued by the WAIRC in June 2020 granted an increase in pay rates under this award effective from the first pay period on or after 1 January 2021.







# Three Step Check: to make sure this WA award summary is relevant to you

#### Step 1

- is the business in the state system?

This WA award summary applies to businesses in the **state industrial relations system.** It covers businesses (and their employees) that operate as:

- ✓ **sole traders** (e.g. Jane Smith trading as Jane's Liquor Store)
- unincorporated partnerships (e.g. Jane and Bob Smith trading as Jane's Liquor Store)
- unincorporated trust arrangements (e.g. Jane and Bob Smith as trustees for Jane's Liquor Store)
- incorporated associations and other non-profit bodies that are not trading or financial corporations

This summary does **not** cover businesses and organisations in the national 'fair work' industrial relations system which operate as:

- Pty Ltd businesses that are trading or financial corporations (e.g. Smith Pty Ltd trading as Jane's Liquor Store)
- incorporated partnerships or incorporated trusts
- incorporated associations and other non-profit bodies that are trading or financial corporations

#### Step 2

- is the business covered by the Licensed Establishments Award? The Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award covers many types of retail businesses in the state industrial relations system. Businesses covered include:

- ✓ Liquor stores
- ✓ Liquor wholesalers

#### Step 3

- is the employee's job covered by the Licensed Establishments Award? The Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award sets pay rates, working hours and other employment arrangements for employees working as:

- ✓ Shop assistants
- Window dressers
- ✓ Store persons



Employers covered by this WA award are legally required to keep employment records. Employers can be fined up to \$5,000 for not keeping employment records, for keeping inadequate or fraudulent records, or for not providing records to Industrial Inspectors when required to do so. Page 6 details record keeping requirements.

The Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award is a legal document that outlines the minimum wages and conditions of employment that must be provided to employees who are covered by the award. Employers and employees cannot agree to lesser conditions.

Industrial Inspectors at the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety have statutory powers to investigate employee complaints about underpayment of wages or leave entitlements under this WA award and state employment laws. The department can prosecute employers in the Industrial Magistrates Court for not paying the rates of pay, including overtime, penalty rates and allowances required by this WA award.

All rates of pay are gross rates (before tax). The 2020 State Wage Order increased pay rates effective from the first pay period on or after **1 January 2021**. The tables below provide the rates that apply from the first pay period on or after **1 January 2021**.

#### **Registered trainees**

- Registered trainees are employees who are undertaking a traineeship registered with the <u>Apprenticeship Office</u> at the Department of Training and Workforce Development.
- Adult and junior employees undertaking a registered traineeship are covered by the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award and the relevant pay rates are outlined in the tables below.
- An employer is required to pay a registered trainee for time spent at TAFE (or other off the job training) as normal working hours. An employer is not required to pay TAFE fees on behalf of the registered trainee.

# Registered trainee rates of pay – applicable from the first pay period on or after 1 January 2021 until end of last pay period commenced in June 2021

#### Adult registered trainees

A registered trainee who is 21 years of age or older must be paid \$582.00 per week.

#### Junior registered trainees

The pay rates for a registered trainee who is under 21 years of age are based on the highest level of schooling the registered trainee has completed, and how long they have been out of school. The rates below apply to full time registered trainees working a 38 hour week.

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#### Meal breaks

- Meal breaks must be not less than 30 minutes nor more than one hour. Meal breaks must be taken after not more than 5 hours nor less than 3 hours of work.
- An employee must also be allowed a 10 minute break each day either in the first or second half of the employee's shift that day (Monday to Saturday inclusive).
- Such break must be taken in accordance with Clause 10 Meal Times and Meal Allowances of the award.



#### Allowances

#### Meal allowance

When an employee is required to continue working after the usual finishing time for more than one hour they must be paid \$12.75 for the purchase of any meal required.

#### Location allowance for employees in regional areas

- Employees employed in certain regional towns must be paid the location allowance relevant to that town. Rates listed below are for adult employees working full time. Junior employees, casual employees, part time employees, apprentices and trainees must be paid proportionate location allowance based on the proportion which their weekly wage is to the adult rate under the WA award.
- If an employee has a dependant (a spouse or partner, or a child if there is no spouse or partner) the employee is entitled to receive double the allowance specified for the relevant town except if the dependant also receives a location or district allowance payment as part of their own employment.
- If an employee has a 'partial dependant' (a dependant who receives a district or location allowance of their own which is less than the location allowance the employee is entitled to under this award) the employee is entitled to receive:
  - o the relevant location allowance for the employee's town; plus
  - o an amount equal to the difference between the employee's location allowance and the amount their partial dependant receives in district or location allowance.

• If an employee receives free board and lodging, or is paid an allowance for board and lodging, the rate of location allowance is adjusted to 66.67% (two thirds) of the rate for the relevant town.

#### Hours and overtime

The hours and overtime arrangements and information on meal breaks provided below are for retail establishments only. For details of hours arrangements in wholesale establishments, please consult the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award on the WA Industrial Relations Commission website <a href="https://www.wairc.wa.gov.au">www.wairc.wa.gov.au</a>

#### Retail establishments - Ordinary hours

- Ordinary hours are an average of 38 hours per week to be worked on one of the bases outlined in the award.
- An employee must not be rostered for more than 10 days in any two week period.
- For shop assistants, demonstrators, window dressers, store person, packers and despatch hands the ordinary hours are worked between 7.00am and 10.00pm on Monday to Saturday inclusive.
- All ordinary hours of work performed between 6.00pm and 10.00pm Monday to Friday inclusive must be paid at a loading of 20% in addition to the ordinary rate.
- Work performed by employees on Saturdays may incur extra loadings. Please see Clause 32 Saturday work (Retail Establishments) in the full copy of the award on the WA Industrial Relations Commission website www.wairc.wa.gov.au for details.

## Part time employees

- A part time employee may be engaged any day Monday to Saturday inclusive, for a maximum of 60 hours per fortnight with not more than 10 daily work commencements in any fortnightly period.
- A part time employee must not be engaged for more than nine and a half consecutive hours exclusive of meal times on any one day (or 11 hours on the day of late night trading).

#### **Overtime**

- All time worked outside of the ordinary hours must be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first two hours and double time after that.
- Work performed on Sundays must be paid at the rate of double time.



An employer may **only** make a deduction from an employee's pay if:

- the employee has agreed to the deduction in writing, (as part of a written employment contract or otherwise) and the deduction is on behalf of the employee;
- the employer is authorised by the WA award to make the deduction and the deduction is on behalf of the employee; or
- the employer is required by a court or a State or federal law to make the deduction (e.g. tax that must be withheld from the employee's pay).



# **Employment records**

- Employers are legally required to keep employment records which demonstrate that employees have been paid all entitlements under the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award and relevant legislation.
- Employers must keep all employment records for at least seven years after they are made for both current and
  past employees. Records relating to long service leave must be kept for seven years from the date employment
  ends.
- Employers can be fined up to \$5,000 by the Industrial Magistrates Court for not keeping employment records or for keeping inadequate or fraudulent records. Employers often fail to keep sufficient detail in their employment records.
- Employers must keep records that detail:
  - Employee's name
  - Date of birth if under 21 years of age
  - Date employee commenced with the employer
  - Total number of hours worked each week
  - The gross and net amounts paid to the employee
  - o All information required to calculate long service leave entitlements and payment
  - o All pay deductions and reasons for them
  - Name of WA award that applies
  - o Daily start and finish time and meal breaks taken
  - o Employment status (full time, part time, casual)
  - o Employee's classification under the award
  - All leave taken, whether paid, partly paid or unpaid
  - Any other information necessary to prove that the wages received by an employee comply with the requirements of the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award, such as overtime hours worked and allowances paid. - Employment records can be written or electronic as long as they are in a form that can be printed. Time and wage books can be used to keep employment records, however, it is the employer's responsibility to ensure the time and wage book includes all of the required information.
- The records must be in English.
- Wageline's <u>Employment record obligations for WA award employers</u> publication helps state system employers keep correct employment records. The publication features helpful step by step guides to record keeping and Wageline's new look <u>record keeping templates</u>.

#### **Payslips**

- Employees may be provided with a payslip each pay period which includes the number of ordinary hours and overtime worked each day and the totals and the wages and allowances paid and any deductions made.
- If a payslip is not provided the employee may inspect the payment records.
- Wageline's Employment record obligations for WA award employers publication includes a payslip template.



## Employment of children

- Under the Children and Community Services Act 2004, it is illegal to employ children under the age of 13 in this
  industry, except if the child is working as part of a school program (e.g. work experience placement) or in a family
  business. School aged children must not be employed during school hours, unless participating in a school
  program.
- A child aged 13 or 14 years may work in a retail establishment if the employer has obtained written permission from a parent or guardian of the child. It is illegal to employ children aged between 13 and 15 years before 6:00am or after 10:00pm.
- The <u>Employment of children laws in WA shop, restaurant, fast food or takeaway food businesses</u> page has more
  information about employing children under the age of 15 years, including a <u>self-audit checkist</u> and a <u>template</u>
  form for written permission for 13 and 14 years old workers.



# Public holidays

- Full time employees are entitled to public holidays (or days substituted for public holidays) without deduction of pay. Part time employees are entitled to public holidays (or days substituted for public holidays) without deduction of pay if they would ordinarily be required to work on that day.
- If a public holiday falls on a Saturday or Sunday, the following Monday will be considered to be the public holiday. If Boxing Day falls on a Sunday or Monday, the following Tuesday will be considered to be the public holiday. When a public holiday is substituted with another day, the public holiday itself is no longer considered a public holiday for the purposes of the award.
- If an employee works on a public holiday or substituted public holiday, they must be paid at the rate of double time and a half.

This WA award summary covers the basic leave entitlements for employees covered by the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award but does **not** include all details on leave obligations and entitlements. Full details of conditions are contained in the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award on the WA Industrial Relations Commission website <a href="www.wairc.wa.gov.au">www.wairc.wa.gov.au</a>, the *Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993* and the *Long Service Leave Act 1958*.

#### **Bereavement leave**

- All employees, including casual employees, are entitled to two days paid bereavement leave per occasion on the
  death of a spouse, de facto partner, parent, step-parent, grandparent, child, step-child, grandchild, sibling or any
  other member of the employee's household. The two days need not be consecutive.
- Bereavement leave is a minimum entitlement from the Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993.

#### **Parental leave**

Employees, including eligible casual employees, are entitled to the unpaid parental leave entitlements in the National Employment Standards of the *Fair Work Act 2009*, as well as a number of more beneficial conditions contained in the *Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993* (a return to work after parental leave on a modified basis and a reversion to pre-parental leave working conditions). Visit the <u>Parental leave</u> page for more details.

#### Sick and carer's leave

- Sick and carer's leave entitles a full time or part time employee to paid time off work due to either illness or injury
  to themselves (sick leave), or because they have to care for an ill or injured family or household member (carer's
  leave).
- Full time and part time employees are entitled to paid sick and carer's leave equal to the number of hours they would ordinarily work in a two week period, up to 76 hours per year. Sick and carer's leave is a cumulative entitlement, and any leave not taken in one year can be carried over to the next year.
- Sick and carer's leave accrues on a weekly basis for full and part time employees.
- In the first year of employment, a full time or part time employee can use any paid sick and carer's leave that they have accrued to date for caring purposes.
- In the second and subsequent years of employment, a full time employee can only use a maximum of 76 hours of their accrued sick leave entitlement for caring purposes, or a part time employee the relevant proportion of 76 hours based on their ordinary hours of work.
- An employee is entitled to up to two days of unpaid carer's leave per occasion if an employee does not have sufficient paid leave accrued or has exceeded the maximum amount of carer's leave that can be taken in any 12 month period.
- Casual employees are not entitled to paid sick leave or paid carer's leave. Casual employees can access up to two day's unpaid carer's leave per occasion.
- Sick and carer's leave is a minimum entitlement from the Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993.
- Wageline's <u>Sick leave calculation guide</u> can assist with calculating sick and carer's leave entitlements.
- Wageline's Employment record obligations for WA award employers publication includes a leave record template.

#### **Annual leave**

- Full time employees are entitled to a minimum of four weeks of paid annual leave for each year of completed service, up to 152 hours. Part time employees are entitled to a minimum of annual leave of four weeks per year paid on a pro rata basis according to the number of hours they are required ordinarily to work in a four week period. Casual employees are not entitled to annual leave.
- Annual leave is a minimum entitlement in the Minimum Conditions of Employment Act 1993 and the Licensed Establishments (Retail and Wholesale) Award sets out additional requirements regarding annual leave and annual leave loading.
- During a period of annual leave an employee must be paid annual leave loading of 17.5%.
- On termination, annual leave loading of 17.5% is paid out on fully accrued annual leave entitlements for completed
  years of employment. Annual leave loading is not paid on proportionate leave (leave accrued in an incomplete
  year of employment) on termination.
- Annual leave accrues on a weekly basis:
  - A full time employee accrues 2.923 hours of annual leave for each completed week of work.
  - A part time employee accrues the relevant proportion of 2.923 hours annual leave for each completed week of work.
- Wageline's <u>Annual leave calculation guide</u> can assist with calculating annual leave entitlements.
- Wageline's <u>Employment record obligations for WA award employers</u> publication includes a leave record template.

#### Long service leave

- Long service leave is a paid leave entitlement for employees who have continuous employment with 'one and the same employer' for a specified period. Full time, part time and casual employees are entitled to long service leave under the Long Service Leave Act 1958.
- To be entitled to long service leave an employee's employment with their employer must be continuous. The amount of their long service leave is determined by the employee's period of continuous employment.

- There are a range of paid and unpaid absences or interruptions to an employee's employment that count towards the employee's period of employment for the purposes of accruing long service leave. Some other types of absences do not break an employee's continuous employment, but do not count towards an employee's period of employment for the purposes of accruing long service leave. See the <u>Long service leave – What is continuous</u> <u>employment</u> page for more information.
- 'The one and the same employer' also includes employers who previously owned a business, where there has
  been a transmission of business. This means an employer who buys or otherwise acquires a business or part of a
  business will take on the long service leave obligations for existing employees if there has been a transmission of
  business. This applies regardless of anything written in a sale of business contract.

#### **Taking long service leave**

The long service leave entitlement for full time, part time and casual employees is:

- after 10 years of continuous employment with the one and the same employer  $-8^{2/3}$  (8.667) weeks of leave on ordinary pay; and
- for every 5 years of continuous employment with the one and the same employer after the initial 10 years  $-4^{1/3}$  (4.333) weeks of leave on ordinary pay.

#### When employment ceases

Employee with between 7 and 10 years of continuous employment When an employee with at least 7 but less than 10 years of continuous employment resigns or is terminated, they are entitled to pro rata long service leave on the basis of  $8^{2/3}$  (8.667) weeks for 10 years of continuous employment. This entitlement:

- is calculated on the employee's entire period of employment; that is, years, months, weeks and days;
- applies to employees who resign, are made redundant, die or whose employer has terminated them for any reason other than serious misconduct; and
- does not apply to an employee whose employer has terminated them for serious misconduct.

Employee with 10 or more years of continuous employment

#### Full entitlement – 10 years or more of continuous employment

An employee who resigns or whose employment is terminated for any reason is entitled to:

- 8<sup>2/3</sup> (8.667) weeks of leave if they have completed 10 years of continuous employment; and
- an additional  $4^{1/3}$  (4.333) weeks of leave for each subsequent 5 years after the initial 10 years of continuous employment.

#### Pro-rata entitlement - more than 10 years of continuous employment

When an employee with more than 10 years but less than 15 years of continuous employment resigns or is terminated, they are entitled to pro rata leave. This entitlement:

- is calculated on the basis of 8<sup>2/3</sup> weeks for 10 years of continuous employment for each year of employment since they completed 10 years of continuous employment;
- is calculated on completed years of employment only; that is, it does not include months, weeks or days; and
- does not apply to an employee whose employer has terminated them for serious

This pro rata entitlement (calculated on the basis of  $8^{2/3}$  weeks for 10 years of continuous employment) will also apply to each year of employment since an employee completed 15, 20, 25, 30, 35 years etc. of employment.

- The Long service leave pages of the Wageline website contain extensive information on:
  - What counts as continuous employment, including details on the impact of various types of paid and unpaid absences or interruptions on continuous employment.
  - What happens when business ownership changes.

# Resignation, termination and redundancy

#### Resignation by the employee

- Full time and part time employees are required to provide:
  - o a "moment's notice" in the first month of employment;
  - o one day's notice in the second month of employment; and
  - o one week's notice after that.
- Casual employees required to provide one hour's notice.

#### **Termination**

- An employer is required to give a casual employee one hour's notice of termination.
- Except in cases of serious misconduct, an employer is required to give full time and part time employees the following period of notice of termination (or payment in lieu):

Period of continuous service	Notice period
Not more than 1 year	1 week
More than 1 year but not more than 3 years*	2 weeks
More than 3 years but not more than 5 years*	3 weeks
More than 5 years*	4 weeks

<sup>\*</sup>Employees over 45 years of age with two or more years of continuous service must receive an additional week's notice.

#### Redundancy

- An employee is redundant when their employer has made a definite decision that they no longer wish the job the employee has been doing to be done by anyone.
- When an employee has been made redundant they are entitled to receive:
  - o the appropriate notice period or pay in lieu of notice, as outlined in the Termination section above;
  - o paid leave for job interviews;
  - any unpaid wages;
  - o any unused accrued and pro rata annual leave
  - any unused accrued long service leave;
  - o pro rata long service leave (if applicable); and
  - severance pay (if applicable).

#### Severance pay - Employers who employ 15 or more employees

- Employers covered by this award who employ 15 or more employees must pay severance pay when an employee is made redundant, as outlined in the table below.
- Employers who employ less than 15 employees are not required to make severance payments to redundant employees.

Period of continuous service*	Number of weeks severance pay
Less than 1 year	Nil
1 year and less than 2 years	4 weeks
2 years and less than 3 years	6 weeks
3 years and less than 4 years	7 weeks
4 years and less than 5 years	8 weeks
5 years and less than 6 years	10 weeks
6 years and less than 7 years	11 weeks
7 years and less than 8 years	13 weeks
8 years and less than 9 years	14 weeks
9 years and less than 10 years	16 weeks
10 years and over	12 weeks

<sup>\*</sup>An employee's period of continuous service includes any service with that business under a previous employer where there has been a transmission of the business.

- These severance pay requirements do not apply to probationary employees, apprentices and trainees, casual and contract employees or employees terminated due to serious misconduct or for other reasons not related to redundancy.
- Redundancy pay is calculated based on the applicable number of weeks' severance multiplied by ordinary time earnings. Ordinary time earnings excludes overtime, penalty rates, and allowances.
- If the employee resigns during the notice period, they are entitled to the same severance pay they would receive if they had worked until the end of the notice period. However, in this circumstance the employee is not entitled to payment in lieu of notice.

#### **Dismissal requirements**

- Under state laws, employees cannot be dismissed if to do so would be harsh, unfair or oppressive. There must be
  a valid and fair reason for dismissal, such as:
  - o consistent unsatisfactory work performance (which has been raised with the employee and the employee given further training and an opportunity to improve their work performance)
  - o inappropriate behaviour or actions or
  - serious misconduct.
- The <u>Dismissal information</u> page outlines obligations and requirements when an employee is terminated.



### Classifications

**Shop Assistant** means an employee performing one or more of the following functions in a retail wine, spirit and liquor shop:

- The receipt into and preparation for sale and or display of goods in or about any shop.
- The pre-packing or packing, weighing, assembling, pricing or preparing of goods or provisions or produce for sale.
- The display, shelf filling, replenishing or any other method of exposure of presentation for sale of goods.
- The sale of goods by any means.
- The receiving, arranging or making payment by any means.
- The recording by any means of a sale or sales.
- The wrapping or packing of goods for despatch.
